Swimmin 'stangs get silver Dudley, relay unit set records

Elaine Dudley broke the record in the 100 freestyle and she was part of the 400-meter freestyle relay team, along with sister Amanda, Joanna LaFrance and Alison Ryan that broke a 22-year-old school record at the annual southwestern swim championships held Saturday, Feb. 6 in Cape Elizabeth.

The Mustangs were at their best for much of the event, securing 220 team points and a runner-up finish to champ Kennebunk who put up an eye-popping

311. Yarmouth was third, well in back of Massabesic and the Rams, with 159, Thornton Academy had 152 and Sanford rounded out the top 5 with 150.

Twelve schools competed.

Dudley won her two solo events: The 200 freestyle, where she was the only swimmer under 2:00 (1:56.30) and the 100 freestyle where she was one of just three swimmers to hit the wall in under 1:00 (53.90).

"We had great day as a team everyone lowered their times across the board, it was fun to be a part of," said Dudley, a senior

GETTING FIT LOCALLY

Are you one of the 66 percent of Americans who set a fitness goal as one of their New Year's Resolutions? Are you afraid you might end up being the one in three Americans who can't make it through the end of January? Well, you don't have to do it alone. There are lots of local fitness classes and groups in the area to keep you motivated and help you reach your fitness goals. The Reporter will periodically feature these local fitness options.

Limerick Zumba

Limerick Zumba started six years ago at the instigation of two local ladies, Martha Hamilton-Smith and Celia Wakefield, who wanted to bring Zumba to Limerick. They contacted Robin Hoose, whom they found on the Zumba.com website. Hoose was teaching at the University of Southern Maine at the time, had a Bachelor's in Science in Human

Nutrition and Food and a Master's in Exercise Physiology. She also lived locally – in Limerick! "They contacted me and asked if I would be interested," reported Hoose, "then they negotiated for me. They made arrangements to speak at a town meeting, spoke to the selectmen and came up with a rent amount by the hour for use of the town hall (it's usually rented for the day)," and Limerick Zumba was born.

Zumba is a total body, interval-style workout, mixing low-intensity and high-intensity moves, combining all elements of fitness, from cardio, muscle toning, balance and flexibility. It uses Latin and world rhythms, and classes are often referred to as a "dance fitness party," or "exercise in disguise."







Hoose had always been interested in fitness. She grew up with four older brothers, and was always very active. In high school, she had a job in an office with her neighbor and commuted with him back and forth to work. "He went to the gym every day after work," she said. "So I worked out, too. That's how I got into body building." In college, Hoose, who was an art major, "got more interested in the science," and saw resistance training as more like an art form. "I was sculpting the body," she said. She earned her certification in Personal Training and Group Exercise.

"I always loved to dance, but had no formal training," said Hoose. She had studied jazz, flamenco and some ballet at college. "I fell in love with it," she said, and always included dance in her group exercise classes, including street funk and salsa. It was the dance that attracted her to Zumba. "I was already kind of teaching it!" she said. So 8 or 9 years ago, she earned her certification in Zumba.

Every six weeks or so, Zumba sends a DVD and a CD with eight new songs. Instructors can pick and choose which ones to use and are offered two options for choreography. The rhythms tend to be salsa, meringue and African. "I like to mix and match," said Hoose. She also

uses her own music. "I like songs that are fun and inspirational," said Hoose. "I use funk, hip hop, rock and roll and pop. I pick the song and do my own choreography.' There are about 15 songs in a onehour class. "I'm really particular about what I pick," Hoose added. "It takes about 10-12 hours just to select songs and practice and learn the choreography." Seventy percent of the music in Hoose's classes comes from Zumba, "because you should have an idea of the choreography between classes, and if you go to other classes."

Classes are usually bigger in the winter, Hoose reported. There is no A/C in the Town Hall in the summer so the group usually takes a break from mid-July to September. There are currently about ten "regulars" who come to class each week, from Limerick, Hollis, Newfield and Waterboro. The room on the second floor at the Brick Town Hall can hold up to twenty people. Some women have been with Hoose from the beginning, like Sue Korn of Parsonsfield. "It is absolutely addictive," said Korn. "The positive feeling you get, you want it to keep on going!" And then added, "There is such camaraderie in the room. The ladies are wonderful. Everyone loves it!" Korn herself had knee surgery a while back, and that didn't keep her from coming to Zumba! "I just did what I could in a chair!"

Korn was also Hoose's first "guinea pig" in her "Feel Great in 28" program. It is a healthy nutrition, balance, harmony and en-

lightenment program.

There are new people as well. Lisa Estabrook from Limerick, was at the class for only the second time! "It's great!" she said. "Not what I thought. I thought it would be easier! But, you make it your own intensity." Hoose's motto: "Move, Smile and Sweat!" Estabrook continued, "The music is great. It's a great group of ladies. It's really fun, and I'm glad we have it here."

"It's a morale booster." added Susie Baker from Shapleigh. She has been coming for two years. "I love it," she said. "It is a great group of women."

Hoose's program has blossomed. In 2016, she began to offer a Resistance Training Class at her home. Hoose also has a Healthy Lifestyle Program that she started as a pilot, a Nutrition and Weightloss Group. "We focus on the whole person, body, mind and spirit," said Hoose, "not just on losing weight."

Limerick Zumba meets on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6 to 7 p.m. in the Brick Town Hall on the second floor. The cost is \$7 per class with dicounted rates for 6 weeks and anyone can join at any time. "Consistency matters when it comes to fitness," Hoose added. "I want people to get the benefits [of the 6 week session]."

Mustangs stomp Spartans

Massabesic's varsity boys' basketball team jumped out to an 11-5 first quarter lead over Sanford and never looked back on their way to an easy 70-36 win on senior night at Massabesic High School on West Road held, Thursday, Feb. 4.

The win lifted the Mustangs to a 14-4 record, their best mark in 15 years, and they secured the third seed in the playoff standings, their first trip to the tourney since the 2004-2005 campaign.

Playing in front of a capacity crowd - police had to turn fans away as the fire code capacity number of 800 was reached well before tip-off – may have given the home team a bit too much adrenalin as the first quarter, while well paced, was certainly sloppy.

The Mustangs, with eleven seniors on the squad, settled into the moment early in the second quarter and got their game going, outscoring Sanford 19-9 and sending them into the break with a 16-point bulge at 30-14.

After the break it was more of the same as the Mustangs, who've shown their tremendous depth all year, got contributions from up and down their bench.

Tyus-Sprague Ripley had 11 of his game-high 19 in the third, helping to expand the lead to 51-23 with just the fourth to play.

They closed the game with the crowd in full-blown standing ovation mode and the good feelings spilled over to the post game as young fans seeking autographs mobbed the players.

Dan Amabile had 12-points, Ryan Gullikson had 8, Weston Bergeron had 7, Josh Daigle and Dawson Renaud each had 6, Adam DeAngelis and Bryson Murry each had 4 and Jake Caldwell had 2 for Massabesic.

The Mustangs were scheduled to face Scarborough (6-12, and a 81-39 loser to host Massabesic back on Jan. 29) in the first round of the class AA south playoffs on Thursday, Feb. 11 at the Expo. The winner advances to the second round at the Expo on Feb. 19.



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
