Perhaps the most important common bond shared by all of humanity is the universal language of music. It speaks to each of us. We understand it, desire it and keep it close to our hearts. ## What's on tap for Maple Sunday?

For the 33rd year in a row, the fourth Sunday in March will be Maine Maple Sunday, and this year it falls on March 27, Easter Sunday. While some producers hoped to have the official celebration date changed to avoid Easter, when it was not changed, they were left to make their own choice. So while most York County sugarhouses will be open on Easter, because some producers have decided to close that day, the opportunity to celebrate Maine Maple treats and activities has been expanded.

Ordinarily most sugarhouses would host an open house either Maple Sunday or both days that weekend, but this year, both Hilltop Boilers in Newfield and Harris Farm in Dayton plan to be open the previous weekend, March 19 and 20, with Hilltop also open Saturday March 26.

Earlier, this year's mild and unpredictable weather had maple producers hopeful that the early start would result in a strong season, according to representatives of the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, and the Maine Maple Producers Association (MMPA).

But, as the season has pro-

gressed, sap has run fast and hard on days with freezing nights and warm sunny days, but not every day. Kelley Levine of Lost Cabin Sugar Bush in Limington says on a very warm day last week, they got 60 gallons in one batch. "When the sap really gets going that's what we see. But this week a few days with the temperatures not getting into the 40s we didn't get much. And with the heat that's coming, we may not have a long season."

According to Michael Bryant, owner of Hilltop Boilers in Newfield, "with temperatures hitting 70 degrees in many places on

## The search is on

Betty Towne, a long-time resident of Alfred, and a third grade teacher at Lyman Elementary for 37 years needs a donation of a kidney.

At the end of 2007 during a routine physical she was diagnosed with IgA nephropathy, an autoimmune disease. At the same time it was discovered that she had a growth on one of her kidneys. The doctor sent Towne to a specialist who scheduled her for an operation to remove the growth. This was performed in February of 2008.

In March of 2014, after numerous tests, Towne was added to the list for a kidney transplant. She is monitored closely for factors crucial for a successful transplant.

When Towne needed dialysis she chose the Peritoneal plan, which is a treatment done at home every night while the patient sleeps rather than Hemodialysis which is done at an outpatient treatment center three days a week. Towne has been doing this for almost a year. The at home treatment requires the patient and caregiver to be trained on how to

## Candidates' night

Since the resignation of John Sylvester as town selectmen, several residents have expressed interest in the position. There will be an opportunity for them to explain why they are interested during candidates night on Tuesday, March 15 in Conant Chapel beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Heidi Gendreau, who has been on the zoning board of appeals for seven years, and the comprehensive planning committee for three years, feels "we need to control our spending and try to control taxes."

Tony Palminteri is running for the office "because the town needs fair leadership, (someone who has) the ability to work with other people and has strong business experience."

Arthur Karcher states he "will work for the best interests of the town and being on the planning board and the comprehensive planning committee has seen where the town is going."

John Bshara states his main goal would be "to provide service to the town, and to learn what the needs of townspeople are."

Robert Flaherty says he "will speak for the people and work hard to get the people's voice

heard" and is running for the three-year term on the board.

All the candidates will be on hand March 15 to answer questions from townspeople.

Many ideas were suggested to cut costs and it was pointed out we need the festival because it is a major fundraiser for several groups. 
## Parish church

### Storing maple syrup

Pure maple syrup contains no preservatives and should be refrigerated or kept in a cool dry place after the seal is broken. Properly prepared maple syrup will not freeze, and the freezer makes an ideal storage place.

Syrup may also be heated to 180 degrees and canned in sterilized jars. Process pints in boiling water for 10 minutes. If syrup ferments, it can be restored to full flavor by bringing it just to the boiling point without stirring. Let it simmer for 2 or 3 minutes, then turn off the heat and let it cool to room temperature. Skim all matter that rises to the surface, boil briefly once more and store as above.



### Did you know?

- An average 40-year-old tree will yield about 40 quarts of sap per season. Just enough to make one quart of pure maple syrup.
- A gallon of pure maple syrup will weigh about 11 pounds.
- It takes 40 to 50 gallons of sap to yield 1 gallon of syrup.

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# First winter carnival a success

Despite the very apparent lack of winter, the first Winter Carnival put on by the Massabesic Athletic Boosters last weekend was a big success.

The two-day event kicked off Friday evening with the Lip Sync Showdown. Staff members, volunteers and students from six of the seven RSU 57 schools developed lip sync performances that included costumes and choreographed routines. Parent-Teacher groups from the elementary schools encouraged their students to make posters either during art classes as school or at home, and kids came out in force to cheer on their schools.

The Massabesic High School gym was packed with at least 500 people and the crowd really enjoyed seeing their teachers and friends compete for the custom made "Silver Tones Microphone" Trophy. The judges scored performances based on a rubric that included knowledge of lyrics, use of props/costumes, facial expressions and dancing and audience response and participation. In the end, only a few points separated the top performances and Waterboro Elementary School came out on top, to claim the trophy and a cash prize of \$300, which will be donated to the WES PTO Playground Fund.

When each team registered for the competition, they were asked to submit the name of a school related organization they would like the cash prize to go to should they win. In addition to the lip sync acts, the audience also heard live vocal performances by Massabesic High School students Julia Blackington and Andrew Tibbetts as well as "The Sandalmen," a band from Alfred featuring Christopher Radley, Marcus Clarrage, and Ryan Hersey.

Saturday the carnival featured the Boss of the Boards Cornhole Tournament with 31 teams competing. Cornhole competitions have specific rules, and instead of tossing cloth bags filled with beans, the bags are full of corn. Winners in the adult or "Boss of the Boards" competition were teens Ethan Laverriere and Jason Guinard. Noah Shaw and Ben

The complete lack of snow put a damper on many of the planned activities, including a Dog Sledding/Mushing demo and rides, Snowmobile Tows, Snow Softball, sledding in white water rafts, and more, but the committee decided to go forward with the other activities. Outside there was an obstacle course which featured winter challenges like stacking wood, and changing tires, along with climbing walls, crawling through tunnels and running through mazes. Touch-A-Truck was also a big hit with construction vehicles from Foglio's, a cement mixer from F.R. Carroll, a tow truck from Leighton's Garage, emergency vehicles from Waterboro and Ross Corner fire departments, a snow groomer from Lyman Snowmobile Club and trucks from the Army National Guard.

A Polar Plunge Dunk Tank was a last-minute added feature and some of the MHS coaches including Chris Binette (Boys Basketball), Sara Gallo (Softball), Kevin Tutt (Softball), and Steve Gallo (Boys Lacrosse) along with Activities Director Brendan Scully took turns getting dunked in 30 degree temps in order to raise money for the Mustang Fitness Center Fund.

This is a project that Boosters has decided to take on as renovations that would have allowed for a new weight/fitness room was cut from the athletic complex renovation project after the initial bond issue failed to pass. The dunk tank and raffle raised \$1,300 to add to that fund. Winners of the raffle prizes are posted on the Boosters

Facebook page.

The indoor activities, including bounce houses and face painting as well as "Bumbles Game Cave," which featured giant sized versions of games like Yatzee, dominoes, LCR, tic-tac-toe and Kerplunk were popular all day. The Boosters gave prizes such as stuffed animals, puzzles and games to every child who came out to play.

About 300 people came to the carnival on Saturday. The committee sees this as a very good start to an event they hope to see just grow into more in the future. According to committee chair Jennifer Russell, "Everyone we have heard from who came out said they had a good time and hope the event will come back next year." She added, "This was a huge undertaking and we did not even decide to give it a try until the end of October. We have learned a lot, and are already making revisions and plans for Winter Carnival 2017, which we promise will be bigger and better as we have more time to plan and some experience under our belts."

The hope of the committee is that this event will also put the Massabesic Athletic Boosters in the minds of community members with younger children in the district. They are always looking for more volunteers and hope that parents of younger kids will get involved. "It takes a lot of time, energy and money to do things like make facility improvements. The work being done today benefits the next generation of kids, the ones that are now in the later years of elementary school and early middle school. If folks want their children to have the same type of facilities that other Class A schools have when their kids get to high school, they need to understand that now is the time to help. If they wait until their kids get to high school, it will be too late," said Russell.

## Nomination papers to be available

Nomination papers will be available at town hall on or after March 16. There is one 2-year term and one 3-year term open on the School Board. There are two 3-year term openings for the Select Board and the Water District has one 3-year term position available. Nomination papers must be returned to town hall by 5 p.m. on Monday May 2.

## Planning Board/Zoning update

At the March 8 Select Board meeting, Town Administrator Gary Lamb clarified that the Wednesday, March 16 Planning

Board public hearing is for changes to the town's campground ordinance and not for review of any Little Ossipee Lake Campground changes. Staff assumes that the campground owners will re-submit an application later in 2016.

On Tuesday, March 15 at 6 p.m. at town hall, selectmen and Town Planner Lee Jay Feldman will conduct a workshop on a variety of suggested ordinance changes including design review standards/guidelines, non-conforming lot setback options, and other ordinance sections in need of work. Lee Jay has been spending considerable time researching and compiling this list of changes that will take some time for the Planning Board to work through. The changes will then be sent to the Select Board prior to possible adoption.

including the New York Times and the Huffington Post.

"Sal is an incredible artist," Wardwell said. "He was the marquee artist of the night and I imagined a lot of people would come out to see him. So while the thought of it was a bit scary I decided getting out in front of a New York crowd was the thing to do."

The reaction to the Limerick native was far greater than anything he could have hoped for.

Wardwell opened with a cover choosing Bill Withers 'Ain't No Sunshine (When She's Gone).' His acoustic guitar, soft and comforting, built into blustery fierce notes, surpassed only by the soulful strength of his voice and the crowd reacted. Heartfelt handclaps added percussion to an otherwise folk rendition of the song. The cheers buried any fears Wardwell likely carried onto the stage and he continued with original music from his own collaborative EP with Nate Winter. His set included acoustic versions of 'Eagles in the Sky' and 'Momma Said,' both songs well received by crowd.

"The highlight for me," Wardwell said was "people came back stage to tell me how much they enjoyed the show and wanted to know how they could purchase my music. So I told them to visit our Facebook page...and many actually went to the site on their smartphones before leaving, to make sure they had it locked in."

Wardwell was called out for a second set and did an original, yet to be recorded song called 'Nicole.' It has a vocal hook in the song and each time it came around more and more audience members joined in. He closed out the night with a rendition of the Plain White T's, 'Hey There Delilah.' Wardwell didn't have to sing. The entire crowd began singing along with him.

"Yo! What borough you from?" Someone yelled.

"Limerick." Brian responded. "It's just past the Bronx."


