## Dreams come true in the Corner Room

Julie Murch has always dreamed of being a shop owner in Cornish, and now she is making that dream come true. Two months ago, she signed a lease at 20 Main Street, next to the Inkwell, and her new store, Corner Room Collection opened last weekend. "Having a shop was always a passion," says Murch, "I decided to just do it!"

Murch has always been artistic. As a junior in high school, she was chosen for a special Saturday program at Maine College of Art in Portland. She pursued liberal studies at USM and took art classes. Then she married and had children, "but I always made things," told Murch. "I did portraits and paintings for friends and family. I even did stained glass. I jumped from one thing to another," she said. "But painting is truly what I love to do."

Murch's Dad built houses, and she grew up cutting the wood. "I learned how to use saws!" said Murch. She began making pieces for her own home. "I enjoy working with wood and paint," stated Murch. "I try to use salvaged wood, as I like the worn look." She has some salvaged wood that came from a home in Windham, stepstools, wall cabinets, bureaus and painted furniture that she has acquired from local auctions. She also gets old boards from the Re-Store in Windham, a discount retail outlet, selling new and gently used building materials, appliances and furniture at reduced prices, benefiting Habitat for Humanity. She collects furniture parts, and currently has a collection of "legs" that are waiting to be turned into a project.

The shop is a family affair:

The women in the family are all helping out – Murch's three daughters, her mother and her aunts. Murch's Mom has made bags and pillows to sell in the shop, and the curtains that hang in the window. Her aunt has provided some smaller painted items. Another aunt, who lives out of state, wants to get involved and is making some products to send. Murch's daughters are helping work in the store.

Murch's own handmade products include floorcloths, wall cabinets, mirrors, repurposed benches made from old bureaus, and other unique furniture pieces. She also has purchased products from trade shows and from other local merchants. You'll find maple syrup from Kyle's Maple Sugar Shack in West Baldwin, soap from Casco Bay Soap Company, assorted specialty foods from Pickles and Things in Fryeburg, and other small gift items.

Murch's vision? "To stay different and have people say, 'I love that shop' when they leave."

She intended to open in May, but decided to open early to coincide with the seasonal opening of the Cornish Trading Company across the street, on April 1. "I was going to open Saturday, April 2, but we were here setting up the shop on Friday, April 1, and since the Trading Company opened, there was some foot traffic," reported Murch. "I sold some of my bigger pieces right away!" The early opening also gave Murch and her daughter Catherine a chance to practice on the register and using the Square for credit cards.

"I do expect my shop to evolve as I receive feedback from the community," Murch said.

## Rug hookers at Notre Dame

Rug hookers from Northern Maine to Massachusetts met to work on their pieces this past weekend at Notre Dame Institute on Shaker Hill. And also to share hooking camaraderie. Their work varied from birds, flowers and cats to lobsters, stars and abstracts. A particularly lovely piece would appeal to most Mainers – it featured nautical squares – a lighthouse, lobster boat, lobster

shack, beach roses, seagulls etc. When asked if she was going to hang it on the wall the hooker stated it would go on the floor in a less traveled spot.

There were 26 in the group according to Lauri Troutman of Hampton, New Hampshire who organizes the event. The York County Shelter and food pantry will benefit from their visit because many food items were donated, apparently part of admission. The members also brought stamped burlap pieces to auction (most very large, some partially finished) and copies of "Rug Hooking," a publication well-known to rug hookers. These were old issues up for sale because each issue includes a pattern, plus myriad ideas and resources.

Rug hooking is a very old art supposedly originating with the Vikings. Floor mats were made very early in Yorkshire, England and its popularity extended to the Maritimes, Newfoundland, Labrador and New England. After 1830 when factory-made rugs were produced women in poor families began using scraps to make their own floor coverings,

hooking scraps on burlap. The practice continued from there.

## Town hall

Alfred's favorite didn't win the election, but Steve Martin did receive 152 votes compared to Susan Deschambeault's 130. She received a lot of support elsewhere.

# OPINION Isn't it ironic?

It's nearly twenty years since legendary rapper Tupac Shakur left a Mike Tyson fight in Las Vegas. Immediately following his departure, Shakur and company were stuck at a red light on the Vegas Strip. While waiting for the light to change a white caddy pulled alongside

the famed singers' car. The caddy's back window dropped revealing the nose of .40 caliber Glock, spitting bullets meant to end the singer's life. The first responding officer later told CNN's Ryan Reed he repeatedly asked Shakur if he knew whom the shooter was and Tupac bleeding profusely grew calm shaking his head positively. P.O. Chris Carroll held his own breath as Tupac drew in his and responded to the Officer with two words unfit for newspaper print.

On May 2, 1973, Brooklyn born Joanne Chesimard, an active member of the Black Liberation Army, was one of three individuals pulled over by New Jersey state troopers, James Harper and Werner Foerster. The trio had no intentions of cooperating with the police and opened fire on the unsuspecting officers. One of Chesimard's companions was shot and killed by Harper who reported Chesimard walked up to a

wounded Foerster, lowered her semi-automatic and executed the trooper with a single bullet to the head. Chesimard would become the first woman ever placed on the F.B.I.'s most wanted list where she remains to this day.

President Obama recently ventured to Havana, Cuba. Current newsreels portray a colorful city, seemingly forgotten by time. As a matter of fact, the streets looked more like the set of an American Graffiti sequel, or maybe even the streets of The Fonz's Happy Days, than a turn of the Century City seen in any other country today. The purpose of the Presidents trip was to call an end to the Cold War era sanctions placed on Cuba by the United States back in the early 60's when black radicals were fighting to end the oppression of African Americans in the United States. At the same time Fidel Castro, overthrew a democratic society and named himself the de-facto ruler of a new Communist nation immediately allying themselves with the former Soviet Union, now Putin's Russia.

The President of this Nation, joined the President of Cuba, Raul Castro, Fidel's younger brother as America's Tampa Bay Rays fol-

lowed the President's entourage to Havana where they defeated the Cuban National Team, 4-1. It was an interesting moment in diplomacy as several Cuban baseball defectors shared in tearful family reunions with members still stuck in a dictator's backward regime. A few day's later, The Rolling Stones hosted a free concert for nearly half a million Cubans in Havana.

It's odd to think that Joanne Chesimard may have been one of many in the crowd of Cubans watching the Rays uphold America's pride in it's national pastime. One can't imagine she steered clear of the 60's radical band performing live in the middle of her adopted City. I'm certain she paid close heed to every word spoken by our President, an African American President at that. After all, the normalized relations Obama is calling for between these two nations, usually leads to treaties of extradition and while one New Jersey family waits anxiously for the murderer of their loved one to be brought to justice, Joanne Chesimard, the Aunt and Godmother of Tupac Shakur waits with freedom for a Vegas police homicide unit seeking justice in the execution of her nephew, Tupac Shakur.

She will always be remembered for her love of sewing and playing the piano. Della applied her gift of music by playing piano for the Windham Theatre Group.



Earle was one of the primary movers whose buildings created Peary Village in South Portland.

Earle was a Maine Guide for 35 years and went on to lead Allagash River Trips and teach industrial arts at Biddeford High School. In the 1950’s, Earle led a fishing trip to the Allagash region that included Red Sox legend Ted Williams. He was an avid historian and was the primary compiler of a genealogy volume entitled The Paul Chadbourne Family of Waterboro, Maine. It traced his mother’s family back to 1634.

He was pre-deceased by his first wife Winonah Bowley Ahlquist, granddaughter Alicia Ahlquist, son Philip C. Ahlquist, brother Leroy Ahlquist, sister Pauline Ferrara, brother-in-law Gerald Link, and sisters-in-law Evelyn Bruns Ahlquist and Patricia Weeman Ahlquist.


