Athletic complex question passes by slim margin

Budget also passes

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Every vote counts. After an earlier, more extensive – and expensive plan – to renovate the Massabesic High School athletic facilities was turned down by voters last November, a more streamlined and less expensive plan narrowly passed at the polls Tuesday, June 9, with a final tally of 1,036 yes votes to 1,030 no votes. The fiscal year 2016 school budget also passed with a vote of 1,247-803. School administrators say they are pleased by the outcome of Tuesday's voting.

"I'm delighted and I applaud the support of the community," said Superintendent John Davis. "We believe both the budget and the changes to the track and field will benefit the entire community."

Davis posted an online letter on the RSU 57 website addressed to the Massabesic community thanking the residents of the six towns that make up the district for supporting both the 2016 budget and the athletic complex renovation project that will upgrade the football surface, install new stadium seating, replace a completely deteriorated track, fix up the tennis courts and other improvements.

"On behalf of the students and the entire educational community here in RSU 57, I want to thank you for your support this spring as we built and now have approved the FY16 budget," Davis wrote. In regard to the athletic complex, he said, "Your support of this effort is important as the track has not been usable for the past ten years. The planning on the track and field has already begun with the design and engineering professionals. These repairs and improvements will be much appreciated by our students and the entire community."

The close vote on the complex question points to the concerns many citizens had regarding the expenditure which is budgeted at close to \$4 million. However, several public meetings gave voters a chance to weigh the benefits against the cost, and the yes vote now gives the district the go-ahead to begin implementing the revised plan drawn up by the ad hoc committee members over the winter. Members of the committee are Dominic Vermette, Donald Beane, Heather Silva, James Carroll, Michele Martin-Moore, Jennifer Russell, Colin Walsh, John Davis, and Brendan Scully. Scully, who is the district's athletic and activities director, said he is happy about the outcome of the June 9 vote. "I'm

Support for inmate job training

Program will help inmates transition back into the workforce upon their release

U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King announced that the U.S. Department of Labor is awarding Coastal Counties Workforce Inc. (CCWI) a \$500,000 grant to bolster pre-release employment programs for Maine inmates, providing them with constructive opportunities as they transition back into the workforce. With this grant funding, CCWI will establish an American Job Center at the Cumberland County Jail, the largest jail in the state, in order to provide pre-release employment and career services to inmates.

“Too often, our system does not adequately address the barriers that inmates face as they reenter society,” said Senator Collins and King in a joint statement. “To help former inmates have a chance at success, we must be proactive and ensure that those in prison are given the right tools to return to our communities as productive members of society. By establishing this Pre-Release Employment Project (PREP) at the Cumberland County Jail, CCWI will take a crucial step in developing inmates’ commitment to hard and honest work, while strengthening our skilled labor force and improving our employment rate in the process.”

In May, Senators King and Collins wrote a letter to the Department of Labor expressing their support for CCWI’s grant application to establish PREP at the Cumberland County Jail. The project is part of a broader funding initiative through Department of Labor’s “Linking to Employment Activities Pre-Release” or “LEAP” program. The goal of LEAP is to integrate correctional facilities and workforce development programs to create a support system for transitioning offenders and point them towards constructive careers.

CCWI is a 501(c)(3) non-profit that oversees workforce system services for York, Cumberland, Sagadahoc, Lincoln, Waldo, and Knox counties.

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SMHC names Caregiver of the Year

At Southern Maine Health Care's (SMHC) annual Employee Recognition Dinner, Oncology Patient Navigator Helene Langley, RN, BS, CBCN, CN-BN was named Caregiver of the Year and Security Supervisor Jason Swasey was named the first-ever Rock Star of the Year award winner. Both Langley and Swasey are valuable members of the SMHC team that exude SMHC's core values of compassion, excellence, integrity, collaboration, and stewardship.

"To be chosen for the Caregiver of the Year award, the recipient must not only be a champion of clinical and relationship excellence at SMHC, but they must also share these gifts through involvement in their professional field and in our community," noted SMHC President and CEO Ed McGeachey. "Helene is absolutely devoted to her patients, and they are effusive in expressing their gratitude for her dedication and assistance during their journey with breast cancer. Helene not only empathizes with her patients, she made a commitment to herself over a decade ago that she would spend her professional career helping others beat breast cancer. And now she does that every single day."

Langley's commitment to oncology nursing, and specifically breast cancer, grew from personal experience and love following the

loss of her mother in 1997 after a ten-year battle with breast cancer. After earning her bachelor's degree, Langley worked in medical and pharmaceutical sales for 10 years. She decided to make a career change and joined SMHC in 2005 as unit secretary. Langley found herself drawn to the treatment and support of cancer patients and enrolled in nursing school, from which she graduated in 2009. She became SMHC's first ever Navigator for its Breast Care Center of Excellence in 2011.

Langley is a nationally certified Navigator – Breast Nurse (CN-BN) and is a certified Oncology Nursing Society Breast Care Nurse (CBCN). She helps coordinate SMHC's Tumor Board and Cancer Committee. In 2013 Langley was awarded the Certification of "Nursing Excellence" at SMHC. She is a member of the MaineHealth Breast workgroup, the Maine Medical Center Breast Navigator sub-committee and the MaineHealth Patient Navigation workgroup.

The Caregiver of the Year award is chosen from among nominations received based upon patient comments and peer recommendations throughout the organization. The recipient must meet the following criteria: exemplify extraordinary commitment to patients on a daily basis; show

compassion, empathy and respect in the delivery of care to patients and their families; acknowledge and meet the unique physical, emotional and practical needs of patients and their families and; promote an environment of cooperation and collaboration in which the expertise and experience of all health care professionals are available to patients.

"The Rock Star of the Year is the person SMHC sees as THE outstanding professional and colleague among many at SMHC," said COO Patsy Aprile. "Security Supervisor Jason Swasey stands out even among the best. His colleagues describe Jason as warm and compassionate as well as totally dedicated and highly skilled; someone who goes out of his way to ensure that our patients and staff are secure. What really sets Jason apart is his ability to focus and remain calm and professional in some of the most difficult situations anyone can face. He is the first recipient of SMHC's Rock Star of the Year award and I can't think of anyone who deserves this recognition more than Jason."

Swasey joined SMHC in 2008 and has worked at both the Biddeford and Sanford Medical Centers. He holds a degree in Applied Science in Law Enforcement and is currently working on his master's degree.

very excited about the outcome of the vote. This work will benefit our entire community for years to come and our facilities will provide our student athletes and community members something to be very proud of," he said.

In meetings this spring, Scully presented photos of the deteriorating surfaces of the athletic fields, tracks, and courts and emphasized that the facilities are used not only by students and student-athletes but also by community members who walk the track or use the tennis courts. An artificial surface on the football field will allow local teams to be competitive league-wide against schools who already use artificial turf. Scully said via email that the committee will be meeting with engineers to discuss construction plans and timelines. "There are some procedural steps that need to take place," he said. "The Ad Hoc committee has discussed a plan of completing work on the tennis courts this fall and possibly the storage/public bathroom work this fall and beginning work on the track and field in the spring." Plans will be finalized after meeting with the engineers.

The FY16 school budget showed a relatively small percentage increase at 3.15 percent compared to last year's 4.71 percent and totalled out at \$39,193,137. Money needed to be raised through local assessments was even lower at 2.43 percent or \$22,737,122. Of the six towns in RSU 57, only one town, Newfield, voted no on the school budget. Limerick and Newfield residents both tallied more no than yes votes on the athletic complex question.

Lyman election results

In voting on June 9, residents of Lyman, with a count of 207-168, re-elected incumbent Maurice St. Clair of Lyman as road commissioner in a tight race against challenger Kevin Little of Arundel.

In other open positions in Lyman, candidates ran unopposed. John Huoy, with 220 votes and Jeffrey Demers, with 264 votes, were elected to the two positions on the board of selectmen. Bruce Woodward will once again serve as a director of RSU 57 after receiving 330 votes.

Bradley Nikel received 329 votes for a position of the budget committee. A second budget committee position was open for write-in candidates with three

people each receiving two votes: David Dulong, Ed Lambert, and Carol Lambert. According to the Lyman town office, these candidates have seven days to withdraw. After seven days, if more than one candidate remains in the race, selectmen will have to call a special election and will set a date.

All three articles regarding zoning ordinances changes passed. Lyman voters also passed the RSU 57 athletic field question with a vote of 200-185, while the budget validation referendum question passed 248-135. Lyman will be holding their annual town meeting on Saturday, June 13, at Lyman Elementary School beginning at 11 a.m.

Waterboro elections

Over 900 Waterboro citizens went to the polls on Tuesday June 9 to vote in municipal and school district elections. Incumbent Selectman Gordon Littlefield retained his three-year post with 416 votes. Candidate Peter McHugh received 89, and Dwayne Prescott 232 votes with 108 blanks. In the race for the two-year Selectman term to replace State Sen. David Woodsome, Dwayne Woodsome won with 408 votes, Theodore Doyle received 170 votes and Tim Neill 200 with 64 blanks.

Question 1, the issuance of up to \$700,000 in general obligation bonds or notes of the Town to pay and reimburse the costs to design, construct and equip a sand/salt shed to be located next to the Town's Public Works Garage passed 420 to 373 with 44 blanks. Question 2, Shall the Town approve the 20/20 Comprehensive Plan as recommended by the 20/20 Master Planning Committee also passed 449 to 296, with 96 blanks. Running unopposed, David Benton Sr. received 312 votes for the three-year term as Water District Trustee with 50 blanks.

The proposed RSU #57 school budget passed in Waterboro, with the vote of 481 to 339 with 13 blanks. RSU #57 referendum Article 1 for renovations and improvements to the athletic fields at the Massabesic High School complex passed in Waterboro, with the vote of 424 to 409

with 3 blanks. Rebekah Roy won the position of RSU #57 Board of directors with 367 votes and Michael P. Hayes, who had previously withdrawn, but too late to have his name removed from the ballot, received 285 votes with 97 blanks.

Free dump day

The entire length of Bennett Hill Road was filled with vehicles, many pulling trailers, on Saturday June 5 during Waterboro's Clean-up ("Free Dump") Day. Resident Dave Watson described two trips he made with the first one taking 25, and the second one 5 minutes, when he switched to coming off Deering Ridge Road on the latter, instead of waiting in the traffic on Bennett Hill Road. At one point attendant Bob Gobel reported that things got a little heated, when one resident was, or thought she had been, cut off after the long drive up the hill.

Manager Clint Andrews arrived to open the Transfer Station about 7:45, and spoke with the first woman in line, who was followed by her mother. Andrews asked them what time they had come and they said, "7 o'clock! We wanted to beat the rush. Didn't want to go through that again this year!"

Road Review Committee member Roger Macomber again set up the town's traffic counter, so Andrews could verify that 1208 vehicles had come to the station on Saturday, 362 of which were pulling trailers.

Asked what stood out for him during the free dump day, attendant Pat Chevalier said, "The insanity! There were vehicles, people and trash everywhere! We took in a lot, even metal, which

is free any time, as the town can sell it. We took in so much, more than last year." Andrews agreed, saying that appliances and metal were both up from last year.

E-waste Recycling Solutions of Auburn sent a tractor-trailer and a 4-man team to accept and bale all the electronic waste brought during the day, which Andrews said was a great help. They filled the tractor-trailer to capacity and hauled it away at the end of the day, leaving the transfer station's trailer still full. E-waste's truck returned later in the week to pick up the remainder.

Ossipee Mountain ATVers members combined trail work

that day with returning to pick up trash they saw on Bennett Hill. Club president Todd Abbott said, "It's part of our stewardship of the land. We pick up stuff that people dump instead of paying for, like couches and refrigerators and bring it in. We've worked with Clint for a long time and he takes what we bring in. It's also a service for the landowners who allow us to have trails on their land. We happened to bring it in that day, but it's a common practice for us to see trash as we do trail work, come back with our trucks and haul it in."

Andrews pointed out a sheet with a set of figures for the number of expired propane tanks taken in that day. It listed 89 ten-pounders, one 5-pounder, 88 20-pounders, and one 30-pounders, for a total of 179 tanks.

He said that the huge pile of mattresses, furniture, and everything imaginable would all go to ecomaine now that the facility there can burn it for electricity. "Before they set up a magnet that can remove all the metal from the

ash, we had to pay \$82 a ton to send it to Commercial Paving in Portland. Now we pay \$49 a ton to haul it to ecomaine and its considered a beneficial use as they can both generate the power and also sell the metal."

Asked how long it would take to haul the mountain of trash sitting in the center of the tarred area of the transfer station, Andrews said the goal was for D and E Rubbish Removal to complete the transfer in a week. "Then the crew will sweep the area down and we'll be back to business as usual."

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
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Harvesting hope in a garden

Dennis Willett, who oversees the garden down behind the bakery on Shaker Hill, calls it a no till garden. With hay mulch carefully applied, (straw mulch was too expensive) there is little weeding needed. It was begun principally for low income families. He had two families working the garden last year; this year there are five and more are welcome.

For the gardeners it is a learning experience. Willett, who is a Master Gardener, guides them in caring for the garden. with Kim Schutsky, another Master Gardener. The skills learned by the volunteer gardeners can then be applied to their own garden plots. Because the volunteers put in sweat equity, there is no charge for the vegetables they take home. The garden also provided vegetables for the York County Shelter meals and for the York County Food Pantry last year and will continue in 2015. Thursday night is work night 4:30 to 6:30 when volunteers can come to tend the garden.

He accepts donations of seedlings, but does not need more tomatoes. There are long term vegetables and berries being put in, like asparagus, rhubarb, raspberries and blackberries. He likes vegetables which are "stowable" like root vegetables.

The garden has received a lot of support, with seed donations from Johnny's Selected Seeds, Kitchen Gardens International, and seedlings from local growers like the Tibbett's Family Farm and Gray Farm Greenhouse.

Support has come from the Brothers of Christian Instruction which provided the land and leaves for mulch; the York County Master Gardeners Association and the York County Master Gardeners for their time and seedlings; Sanford Regional Technical Center for landscaping and its horticulture class, members of the businesses and local community and for the donations of green manure, wood chips, and newspaper. All of the support and donations are much appreciated.

There is a border of blooming perennials around the garden, Kim Schutsky's idea, adding to its attractiveness, and a low fence which hopefully will discourage small critters from visiting. The perennials also will attract pollinators. Willett says they don't plant corn or potatoes; both are inexpensive in season.

Fishing derby well attended

There were 53 youthful fishermen attending the 21st fishing derby this past Sunday, held in honor of the late Lester Roberts who dug the pond where the derby is held every year, sponsored by the Springvale Fish and Game Club. Local businesses were generous in donations of prizes, which ranged

from fishing tackle to bicycles.

At noon, when the derby ended, R.J. Lane had caught the largest fish in the boys category, a 19-inch sucker, and Addison Furbush had caught the largest in the girls category, an 18.5-inch rainbow. They each received a bicycle.

The boy with the second largest was Waylon Bucci, with a 14.5-inch pickerel; the girl with the second largest was Tori Lynn Lawrence with a 17.5-inch rainbow. She also caught the most fish with eight. Aiden Gardner's 13.5-inch bass was the third largest in the boys category, and Kayleigh Sanborn's 15.5-inch rainbow was the third largest for the girls.

The smallest fish was caught by Arianna Davis - a 3-inch sunfish. The strangest fish was caught by Buddy Dorr. It was a six-inch turtle. In all, (excluding turtles) 75 fish were caught by the excited children.

Third grade visits museum

A local interview of a veteran who was present at the D-Day invasion at Normandy Beach in France will be sent to Library of Congress for review as part of the Veterans History Project.

Ted Lenz, who resides at Atria in Kennebunk, was interviewed by two Massabesic NJROTC cadets, Chain of Command Allison Dunlap and Operations Officer Alison O'Brien. The interview was conducted prior to Massabesic High School's honorary Memorial Day assembly.

Lenz is a WWII veteran who served in the Army for five years as a Tech Sergeant. He was in Normandy D-Day invasion at Omaha Beach. "The assembly held today was something I'd want to do again. They don't have the parades for the military way back when that they do now. It's nice to be recognized after all these years," said Lenz.

Dunlap will be finishing her third year in the JROTC program. With the many ribbons and award

medals on both cadets' uniforms, Dunlap says the one she is most proud of is her Leadership Academy Cord. "I spent two weeks at Newport Naval Station for an 'area 4' leadership and sail training. It was an intense program, but I made through it."

O'Brien will be finishing her fourth year in the JROTC program. Her proudest medal is the ANVETS American Veterans medal. "This is all about working and volunteering in your unit. I'm very proud of the new cadets and the events being planned. I enjoy watching them move higher in rank and will truly miss it."

Both Dunlap and O'Brien are seniors and will be graduating on June 11. Dunlap has been accepted into Husson University to study physical therapy, while O'Brien is taking up a career as an actor at Drew University in New Jersey for theater and communication.



encourages students' service to their community.

Other community support has been strong as well, with Sanford Institution for Savings donating \$500 and promising \$500 each year the pantry is in operation. In addition, Chicago resident Barry Johnson has donated a small piece of land on Moonpenny Lane adjoining the parcel the pantry group hopes to lease from the town, next to Town Hall. While it is not large enough for a building, the pantry group plans to use it as a parking lot, and it is now registered at the York County Courthouse.

There are now 48 volunteers from many local churches involved with the pantry, and it has a five-member board, including Julie Kelly, SIS Assistant manager, Kathy Smith, treasurer Dick Bateman, a 26-year volunteer at St. Stephens Food for Life, Secretary Elaine Athern and President Cleo Smith.

WCP is now incorporated in the State of Maine, and is registered with the IRS as a 501C3 Non-Profit Organization. The group is registered with PayPal as waterboropantries.org, has a Facebook page, Waterboro Community Pantry, is working on a website to accept donations and Smith and Jane O'Brien are writing grants.

Smith reports that Dana Libby has surveyed the town-owned

land next to Town Hall that the group hopes to lease to build on. The group hopes to build a 25 by 36 foot building with a cellar for food storage, estimating a cost of \$50,000.

WCP is to have a booth at Old Home Days, and has received 30 raffle items to date, including items like a cord of firewood, and many gift cards to local businesses. Volunteers, as well as members of the Massabesic National Honor Society, are selling tickets for the raffle. Forever Young Day-care staff and students will march in the Old Home Days parade and the children will carry small banners urging townspeople to support the Waterboro Community Pantry.

Smith says they will be collecting donations for the pantry in the Kiosk at Hannaford and they have buckets at many town stores to collect funds. "We're not leaving any stone unturned to raise money for the building. We want everyone to know that we're not giving up, may be moving slower than we hoped, but we're moving! We want to set the pantry up on a level surface where people can come inside and sit down. We invite anyone who would like to work with us to make the Community Pantry a reality. The meetings are the second Thursday of each month at 6:30 at rotating churches. To find out where meetings will be held, email cleo@waterboropantries.net."

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

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


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
