MASSABESIC

Dream field a reality

While it can be an exciting time as a new school year begins anywhere, at Massabesic High School, this is an over-the-top exciting fall season as teams play their first games in the brand new stadium that is phase one of the new athletic complex now under construction. There is a tone of school spirit and pride in the voices of athletes, coaches, parents, administration, local business owners and the community at large. Not everything that was originally slated to be completed

by Sept. 1 is fully in place, but the field is ready to go and has seen action during the first week of school with field hockey, soccer and football contests. The approximately 91,102 square foot synthetic turf field will also be the site of lacrosse action in the spring. In addition, the Western Maine Field Hockey Championships for Class A, B and C are slated to take place at the stadium on Oct. 25.

Following the passage of a \$3.1 million bond for the project in June 2015, planning continued and by spring 2016, Stantec of

Scarborough, district engineers for the project, established specifications that were drawn up and included in the two request for proposals (RFP) that were issued; one was for site work, including lighting, track, bleachers, site work and associated items. This was awarded to Sargent Corporation of Stillwater on May 5. The second RFP included the work to purchase, install and warranty a synthetic turf field, and this contract was awarded to NET Sports Group of Saco also on May 5. Site work began in May and is largely completed. According to Colin Walsh, Finance and Operations Manager for RSU 57, there was a

Walking with ease

Waterboro Parks and Recreation will now be offering locals a second session of a new way to stay fit – even if they have arthritis. Thanks to a \$4,000 grant from the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), the National Association of Chronic Disease Directors (NACDD) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Waterboro Parks and Rec. will continue to offer the Walk With Ease program to the York County community. Waterboro is one of just ten communities across the nation to receive the Walk With Ease grant for 2016.

Waterboro’s parks and programs have always been centers of health and wellness in the community. The Walk

A resident of Lyman since 2006, Curtis’s exhibit MEMORY will be open for participation Sept. 17-Oct. 28 at the Bates Mill Complex in Lewiston. This major exhibit marks the end of an 18-year commitment to art-making, a project which began in 1998 and has culminated through nine solo biennials from 2000 to 2016. In the end, Curtis will have installed 81 ambitious audience-activated works throughout 9 vast mill spaces of 8 Maine towns. It’s been Curtis’s intention since 2000 to mount her final solo biennial in Lewiston, host to her first biennial (EXPERIENCE, 2000). “Not only will this bring my project full-circle, but I can say ‘thank you’ to the town that took my work in at the very start.”

Each exhibit is a 22-month

very tight timetable for the project and a lot of work to be accomplished.

The turf field was installed during the month of July. Walsh wrote, "It is a high quality turf field, and as promised, does not contain a crumb rubber infill. The whole project will be of great benefit to the entire district and will be a place for all to enjoy." He added, "Many experts have told the District that there is great value obtained for this project, and it is comprised of solid quality products and planning."

Since the track surface and the scoreboard remain to be added, the ribbon-cutting ceremony that was slated for last weekend has been rescheduled for half time of the homecoming football game on Oct. 14. Also, the annual Meet the Mustangs event has been postponed and the Massabesic Athletic Boosters are working with Activities Director Brendan Scully and the fall teams to find a new date.

Scheduled home games have been played at the stadium until the final track installation, which is slated to happen between Sept. 12 and 22. During that time, games will move to the grass fields. If installation is complete at that point, the remainder of the fall home games will be played on the new turf. Scully says everyone involved is praying for good weather in Pennsylvania, where Nagle Athletic Surfaces is installing the track at their job just prior to Massabesic's, as weather really controls the pace of the work.

The track and scoreboard completion dates were affected by the fact that the initial winning bidder in each case had situations where they were not going to be able to make the required deadline and they retracted their bids, resulting in the need for time to vet a new bidder. Nagle will install the track surface and lining, and Scoreboard Enterprises will install a Daktronics scoreboard that is set to be installed on Sept. 12. The company has pro-

vided a scoreboard and sound system for use in the interim.

When the project began, components of the old facility, including the topsoil and the tar of the old track were removed. A photographic and video timeline of some of this activity can be viewed on the Massabesic Athletic Boosters Facebook page. By July 5 the turf was delivered and NET Sports Group began laying it with completion on July 18. Soon after, lines, numbers and Mustang logos were applied.

After a lot of research, following the concerns raised in a 2014 news report that suggested the possibility that there might be carcinogenic elements in the popular "crumb rubber" infill that has been used in most artificial turf fields, the school administration made the decision to avoid the shredded and reused car and truck tire product and instead to require the use of recycled EPDM, a synthetic rubber material that has been deemed free of any hazardous material.

Both Walsh and Scully describe how they had heard from parents and others at the initial open forums on the complex that, whether or not the fears evoked by the NBC report were proved true, they did not want crumb rubber used. The decision was driven by citizen concern, and the cost of the product they eventually used was higher, but fulfilled that promise. So, while crumb rubber and EPDM look alike, what has been used in this field is a new product that is not repurposed from another use.

The turf used at MHS is called Evolution XQ60, manufactured by GreenFields of California. According to Scully, the way the blades stand up is affected by the composition of the blades, the way they are installed, and the infill that supports them is a combination of the EPDM and silica sand.

Another major element in the stadium design and operation is lighting. Sargent chose Musco, a world leader in stadium and field lighting. Initial testing to see if the installed lighting grids, quantity and height of the lights meet

the requirements has been already been done, and final testing will soon be completed. There are strict standards for lighting for each of the sports that will be played, with lacrosse requiring the strongest lighting and Walsh says the new lights will meet those standards as well.

Walsh and new Superintendent Larry Malone, who worked as assistant last year to now-retired Supt. John Davis describe the process by which decisions were made and quality standards have been insured throughout the process. Cordjia Corporation, an international company with expertise in building fields and stadiums, which is also a senior consultant to FIFA for turf on large and small complexes internationally, has acted and will continue to act as "Owner's Rep" through the entire Athletic Complex process.

While Sargent Corporation is the General Contractor for the complex building process, overseeing and holding sub-contractors accountable, Cordjia, in turn, holds Sargent accountable to meeting the specs of the project, itself overseen by Walsh. All this oversight is put in place to insure the quality of the project for the district and the whole community. According to Walsh, "This is to insure the best use of taxpayer money, so at the end of the day, the project will be done well, be what the community expected and be a source of community pride for years to come."

When asked if the process has proceeded much as planned, Walsh says there were not many changes, as little came up that was unexpected. One exception arose when the wall on the far side of the visitors' side was under construction, and workers discovered that there was material present that could not support the wall. That material needed to be removed. It was not contaminated, just not able to support the retaining wall to be built there. "We knew all along we had set up a very tight schedule, so we kept working to use time as efficiently as possible." He explained that representatives from Cordjia, Sargent, NET and District administration met regularly throughout the project to track it at every step.

In addition, after inspection of the facility by Waterboro Code Enforcement Officer, Glenn Charette, the new bleachers were temporarily closed until the installation of lighted exit signs within the bleachers and the installation of safety glass on the windows of the press box atop the home bleachers were completed. Sargent provided temporary bleachers for the interim. It was anticipated the bleachers would be available for use for the first home football game against South Portland the evening of Sept. 9.


To date, the field project that started in May, has been completed in four months, and the District, after full satisfaction that all specs have been met, has signed off and taken over that part. Walsh and Scully anticipate completion of the stadium complex by this fall. Scully says, "When the track, the long jump, triple jump, discus, shot put and pole vault space renovations are complete, this will be the first year that Massabesic will be able to host a home track meet since 2005. That's eleven, going on 12 years that we haven't been able to host and it will be so good to finally be able to offer these events,

and to offer the community the opportunity to walk/run the track. For people to walk, to push baby carriages, in a safe place will be a real gift to the community."

Superintendent Larry Malone, in a written statement, said, "This project is a very exciting addition to the district and a great opportunity for our student athletes and the communities. The feedback we have received thus far has been very positive and supportive. At a recent soccer game, a few of our student athletes were overheard commenting, 'This feels like we are at someone else's field because it looks so awesome.' We know the communities will recognize the great value in this project."

Scully describes these current elements of the larger project as phase one of the athletic complex, to be completed by Sept. 30. Phase two would fix the tennis courts and locker rooms while phase three involves a complete wellness center.

The boosters, along with a group of concerned citizens and business owners are working to find sources to cover many of the unfunded items in phases two and three. Watch the Reporter for more about this project.

With Ease program was developed through the Arthritis Foundation and has been scientifically proven to help reduce pain and stiffness often associated with arthritis. Studies by the Thurston Arthritis Research Center and the Institute on Aging at the University of North Carolina have found that Walk With Ease was shown to reduce pain, increase balance and strength and improve overall health. Together, NRPA, NA-CDD and the CDC aim to reach more people living with arthritis and help improve their quality of life through this trusted and measurable program administered by local parks and recreation departments.

The Walk With Ease program provided by Waterboro Parks and Recreation started on June 1 and ran its initial session for 6 weeks. A second session will begin on Sept. 12 and run three times per week for six-weeks by certified and trained instructors. The group will meet up at the old Waterboro Town Hall on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 1 p.m. The

classes are ideally suited for anyone that is interested in preventing or managing arthritis and also for those looking for a regular, low-impact exercise program in their local community, and it's free.

"We're looking for three additional instructors now so the program can be held in four communities within York County simultaneously" states Lisa Tutor of Waterboro Parks and Rec, "The grant will cover the cost of the online certification for the instructors, as well as CPR/First aid training if they need it. It's a great opportunity for folks who like to teach fitness and enjoy motivating people to exercise."

process, exploring a different theme while inviting the audience to perpetuate with its 9nine unique installations. "The audience literally completes my creative process. Without their participation, my work is static and unfinished."

Part of her biennial labor is cleaning by hand each mill space (averaging 25,000 s.f.). "It's like detailing really big cars. But I feel that by putting efforts into fortifying and beautifying these historic mills, I'm also giving something back to the towns which so graciously host my work."

Curtis also hopes to give something back to the Maine art community. If Curtis's forthcoming book, 9 SOLO BIENNIALS receives enough printing donations in 2016 (at half the retail

cost), it will spark the Forward Fund, a new grant program for Maine artists to be administrated by Engine, an arts-driven nonprofit in Biddeford.

Curtis's previous solo biennials took place in Lewiston's Bates Mill, Westbrook's Old Sebago Shoe Mill, Brunswick's Fort Andross, Waterville's Lockwood Mill, Sanford's Millstone Place, Biddeford's Pepperell Mill, Winthrop's former Carleton Woolen Mill and Parsonsfield's Robinson Mill.

As with Curtis's previous solo biennials, each of MEMORY's installations will have instructions, the instructions themselves, an integral part of the art. The audience is asked to manipulate, perpetuate, maintain, add, take, exchange, distinguish--while challenged to think about memory in new ways. "Although I have a clear vision for each installation, a desired result or end state, in a way, I'm giv-

ing my work over to my audience. It requires from me a certain balance of control and surrender."

MEMORY is funded in part by grant from Maine Arts Commission, independent state agency supported by National Endowment for the Arts. MEMORY is also funded in part by a Foundation for Contemporary Arts Emergency Grant. Support of MEMORY is provided by SPACE Gallery through The Kindling Fund (www.kindlingfund.org). MEMORY is collaboratively sponsored by the Bates College Museum of Art and sponsored by Kimball Street Studios, Platz Associates, and the Bates Mill Complex.

LYMAN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEWS

Kindergarten children at Lyman Elementary School experienced their first ride on a school bus on Aug. 30. The children and their parents gathered in the lunch room for the presentation from Principal Virginia Drouin, and bus drivers Bob and Sandy. Drouin delivered a brief summary of what the children and parents should know before the first official bus ride to school. The drivers talked to the students using language understandable to Kindergarteners and handed out I.D. stickers plus information that the parents needed to prepare their children for riding on the bus.

Drivers Bob and Sandy explained that safety is the number one priority, so a responsible adult should be at the bus stop to greet each student. Otherwise the bus driver will keep the child on the bus and return him/her to school at the end of the trip. Any changes must go via the school or the transportation office at 247-6181. The school policy requires that the student be assigned to one regular business run. If a child is

to be picked up and dropped off at a different stop written permission must be given to the driver.

Bob and Sandy explained to the young students that when the lights are turned on it means "Be Quiet." The drivers pointed out that most of the buses have cameras in the front and back of the vehicle. Kindergarteners are seated at the front of the bus followed by first graders, etc.

In the event that there is an accident, no child will be released until checked out by an EMT. If any child has an allergy the bus driver needs to know the particulars and if a child has an Epi Pen the driver should know where it is kept.

If a child has an older sibling, they can sit together for the first few weeks or until the younger child feels comfortable.

The group then went outside to practice how to wait for and board the bus safely. The Kindergarten children also learned about the signals the bus driver will use to indicate that it is safe to cross the street in front of the bus. Much enthusiasm accompanied the children's first experience riding a school bus.
