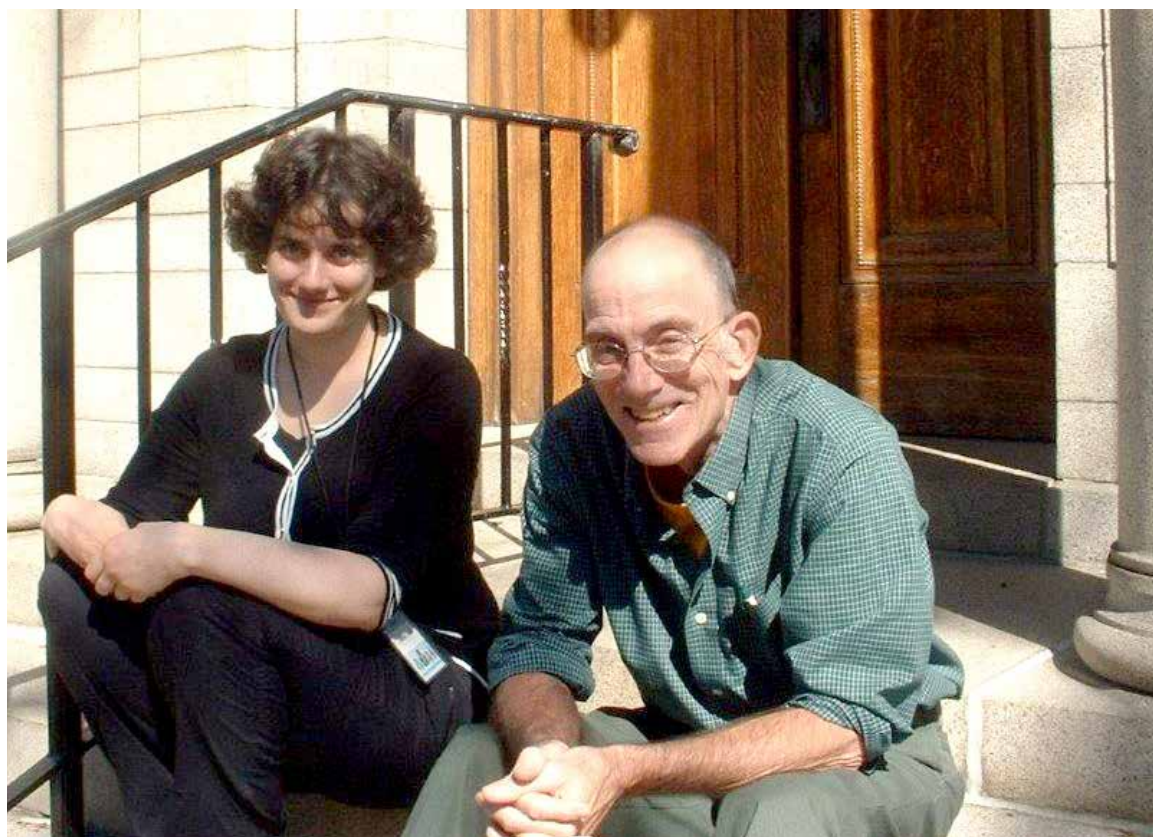

My relatives avoid these problems by renting a post office box in Lubec on the American side of the bridge. I send their mail to the Lubec Post Office, via a cousin

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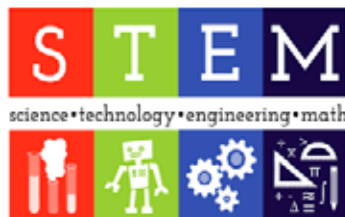

Carley Lovejoy broke a 2-2 tie late in the second half to help lift Biddeford's varsity field hockey team to a 3-2 win over Massabesic in a battle of undefeated teams on Oct. 8. The Mustangs rolled into the contest with a sparkling 11-0 mark, but the defending state champion Tigers showed up boasting a 28-game win streak, setting the stage for a late-season match that lived up to the hype.

Biddeford jumped ahead early with a score at 23:40 when Jayme Walton tipped in a shot off a penalty corner. Anna LaVigne made it 2-0 before halftime, but the Mustangs were undeterred and roared out of the gate after the break with energy and determination that quickly got them back in the match.

Izzy Hurlburt banged home a pass from Cam Champlin at 22:22 to make it 2-1 and the Mustangs

tied it 2-2 nine minutes later when Mary Duffy fed Anna Snyder for a score.

Abby Nadeau made a huge save on a penalty shot to preserve the tie and set the stage for the late game winner from Lovejoy.

Massabesic entered the game against Biddeford having outscored their previous eight foes by a combined 27-3 and they hadn't allowed more than one goal to any opponent since Sept. 12.

Hunter dies from unintentional, self-inflicted gunshot wound

At 5:56 p.m. on Oct. 8, Franklin County Sheriffs' office dispatch received a call from Mark Henderson of Eustis, age 57, who reported that he unintentionally shot himself in the lower left leg while bird hunting on a remote logging road near the northwest shore of Flagstaff Lake in Flagstaff Township.

Game Wardens, State Troopers, US Border Patrol, and Northstar Ambulance all responded and began searching area logging roads for Henderson, and at 7:06, Game Warden Kyle Hladik located Henderson near his truck.

Warden Hladik immediately administered CPR to Henderson and loaded him in his truck. A state trooper drove the warden's truck to meet an ambulance at the Big Eddy Road as Hladik and another trooper continued CPR. Emergency medical personnel administered care to Henderson

for approximately 40 minutes before he died due to his injuries.

There are nearly 215,000 licensed hunters in Maine, and over the last ten years, Maine has averaged only 6 hunting incidents per year, and three fatal incidents over that ten year period.

This is the first hunting incident of the of year. Currently, there are seasons open for hunting for bear, deer, upland birds, waterfowl, turkey and other species. The second week of moose season begins next week. For more information on hunting and hunting seasons, please visit www.mefishwildlife.com.

Hunters are reminded to always treat every firearm as if it's loaded, always keep your firearm pointed in a safe direction, and always be sure of your target and beyond. The department also encourages all hunters to ask first before accessing private land.
