She decided she'd like to use these Flag Boards to honor veterans. "I wanted to give something back to the Veterans for everything they've done," Cross explained. She decided, "I'd like to name Bridges honoring our Veterans!" Thus, her project began. "I've done my research," Cross said. "I've been doing this for the last two years."

What kind of research has Cross done? Well, to begin with, she learned that in order to rename bridges, there must be a bill put through the Maine State Legislature. She worked with Senators Ben Chipman of District 27 and Jim Libby from District 22 to make this happen. The bill has to be renewed each year.

In the meantime, Cross has done been looking for bridges, using the Maine Department of Transportation website. The bridges have to have an official bridge number with the DOT. "I look for a good location, where the flag boards can be seen," Cross explained. Once she has found a suitable bridge, she then contacts the local town, to set up a date for her to come and present the bridge renaming to the town officials. Once she presents, the Select Board/Council then has to approve the new naming of the bridge. When the renaming is approved, a letter of approval is then sent to the State Senate. Then, it takes about 3 months for the DOT to put the sign up on the bridge itself.

Through Honor Flight Maine Board Member Joy Assumption, Cross was able to get in touch with Ed Comeau, who had made the personalized flag Board for Charles Whitney. He agreed to create Flag Boards for the renamed bridges - for FREE! "It's my passion," he said. "I do it for the Veterans." Each bridge's Flag Board has, "Honoring All Veterans, Freedom is not Free" in the stripes of the flag, and on the right, the name of the Bridge and all the Military Branches. "All the Flag Boards will look like this," Cross said.

Cross reports that about 15 towns have approved a bridge being named after our veterans. One of the first was the town of Limerick. Bridge #3157, formerly known as the Sokokis Lake Bridge is now the Sokokis Lake Veterans Memorial Bridge. In Limington, Bridge #2918, formerly known as the Webster Mill Bridge, is now the Limington Veterans Memorial Bridge. And in Hiram, Bridge #2373, is now known as the Hiram Veterans Memorial Bridge. This past week, Cross presented the Flag Board to the Parsonsfield Select Board for the Kezar Falls Memorial Bridge. Select Board members, Aaron Boguen, Jennifer Lewis and David Bower accepted the Flag Board and put it in the display case for all residents to see as they came through to vote on Election Day. Other towns that have already approved renaming Veterans Bridges and have been presented with Flag Boards are: Buxton and Hollis, presented Oct 9, Porter on Oct 16, Waterboro that same week, Parsonsfield on Nov. 4, and Hiram will be presented on Nov. 7.

"It has been so rewarding with all the support from Select Folks and Councils," Cross said. "I am continuing with this project. I love

Cross has already approached Saco, Windham, Brownfield, Denmark, Sanford, Standish, Newfield, Biddeford, Westbrook, Gorham and Scarborough. "I'm always looking for new towns," she said. In addition to town bridges, Cross has another goal. "I'd like to find a town that would name a bridge, 'Honors Flight Maine Veterans Memorial Bridge'."

"I like what I'm doing," Cross said, "and am so happy with the results. It makes me feel good."

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York County government's human resources staff have begun a new program to evaluate employee workstations, with a view to formulating suggestions and options on how to help prevent long term injuries.

The staff recently received training on ergonomic assessment from Jim Toman, a loss control consultant with Maine Municipal Association, and then began to conduct evaluations, upon request.

Marion Bedard, the receptionist at York County Jail, was one of the first county employees to contact HR's Doreen Staples and Jenn Elwell for an assessment.

Her desk is included within a large counter area in the reception area of the jail. It was built 20 years ago and designed so someone sitting at the workstation can see everyone who comes through the front door - just the way Bedard likes it.

The desk itself is original to the jail's construction and in a computer terminal on one side and the telephone system on the other. Sometimes, said Bedard, her shoulders hurt.

They assessed my desk," she said of Staples and Elwell. "And they'll make suggestions."

Ergonomics means designing jobs and workplaces to fit employees and the work that they do, instead of trying to change the worker to fit the job, according to the Maine Department of Labor.

The federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration points out that musculoskeletal disorders that can arise in the workplace may affect muscles, nerves, blood vessels, ligaments and tendons and can lead to a number of issues, from carpel tunnel to shoulder injuries and more.

York County government's Human Resources Director Linda Hutchins-Corliss said the county has been conscious of ergonomics for some time and noted the county government has a diverse group of employees - from sheriff's deputies to corrections staff, maintenance crews, and those who work in offices - to the district attorney's office, the registries of deeds and of probate, and various departments within the government office building.

"The county has been supportive of purchasing risible work u-shape configuration with her desks," she said as an example.

The desks offer the flexibility of sitting or standing, with the work surface designed to be easily raised or lowered.

It is all in an attempt to preventing long term injuries, Hutchins-Corliss noted. "This is a continuing effort to provide all employees with a safe, healthy

working environment," she said.

"I think it is really important to provide ergonomic education to all staff," said Elwell. not only at the outset, but following up, as well. "It's all part of the wellness

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
