Elections and town meeting March 9

The Town of Newfield will have their annual town meeting and elections next Saturday, March 9. Voting will be held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the West Newfield Town Hall, 23 South Effingham Road. The town meeting will be held that evening starting at 7 p.m. where winners of the town elections will be announced, and

sworn in, followed by voting on the annual budget and town warrant articles.

Two items that will be voted on by secret ballot in the morning elections are: to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for the general maintenance and operation of the library; and to see if the town will accept the updated Inventory Section of Comprehensive Plan of the Town

of Newfield.

Some of the items on the town warrant are:

an increase in town salaries by about \$8,000 – from \$127,748.03 to \$133,920.07; to raise \$40,000 to be set aside for a new salt and sand building – the Selectmen and Finance Committee recommend taking \$35,000 from tax

Election March 8, annual town meeting March 9

The Town of Limerick will have their annual town meeting on Saturday, March 9, from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., which will be held at the Brick Town Hall at 19 Main Street.

Voting will be held the day before on Friday, March 8 at the Limerick Town Office at 55 Washington Street, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Wendy Thorne is running unopposed for the position of Select-

man, Assessor and Overseer of the Poor. She has filled the position since June of 2018, when John Medici, the former selectman resigned. Five people serve on the Board of Selectmen for the town, and the others are: Gil Harris, Dorothy Richard, Roland LePage and Joanne Andrews.

Stephen D. Malmude and Glen O. Wagner are both running to fill the 3-year term position as a Trustee of the Limerick Water District. William B. Aronson is

running unopposed to fill a 1-year term on the Water District.

Jennifer R. Morrell is running to fill a 3-year term as a Trustee for the Limerick Library. Danae C. Secunde is also running to fill a 3-year term as a Trustee of the Limerick Library.

Dominic P. Vermette is running to fill a 3-year term for RSU#57 Director.

Suzanne McIntire is running for a 3-year term on the Budget (Continued on page 3)

A Limington business owner recently had the opportunity to experience the Super Bowl behind the scenes. Jeddy Nevells, owner of Naturally Jammin' in Limington, with her husband Mike, joined a Food Network chef to help cater a Super Bowl Tailgate Party.

Years ago, Nevells met Food Network's Chef Elliott Farmer at Portland's Harvest on the Harbor, and they became good friends. This past fall, Chef Elliott got the notice that he would be a participant in the Super Bowl Tailgate Party and when he came to Maine to visit Nevells' store, he asked her if she'd like to join him.

Food for the Super Bowl Tailgate Party is organized by Business Connect, a partnership between the National Football League (NFL) and the Atlanta Super Bowl Host Committee. Every month, the NFL came to Georgia to sample food from various local restaurants and caterers. They chose Chef Elliott's Collard Greens and Smoked Turkey.

Everything had to be delivered to the stadium on Saturday for security reasons, including their own lunches and drinks. "Security was tight," reported Nevells. First, the car had to be scanned before entering the grounds. Then a police escort, one car in front, and one behind, brought you to the entrance. At the entrance, they (Continued on page 2)

had to show their credentials, an ID card for pre-game entrance with their photo ID. "Then you had to go through a security scanner, like at the airport," added Nevells. "One of the safest places on earth!"

In addition to delivering the food, they wanted to see the kitchen they were going to be working out of on game day, and set things up. "The NFL provides everything you need for the event," said Nevells, chafing dishes, sternos, cups, plastic forks, napkins (NFL LIII napkins, of course!). "The inside was amazing, phenomenal," she added.

On Game Day, they had to be through security checks, with a different set of credentials for Sunday (a photo ID on an NFL Super Bowl lanyard with their name, and "Farmer's Gourmet Catering") and in the kitchen by 10 a.m. The Tailgate Party itself was from 2:30-5:30 p.m. There were over 30 restaurants or catering companies there, each one chosen to prepare one special thing. Each "station" looked the same, standardized, with a sign announcing the food being offered. "No person or business was singled out in the marketing," said Nevells. "Everything was streamlined. But you could mention your business in conversation." The team wore grey chef's coats, provided by the NFL, exclusively for the Tailgate Party with the NFL insignia.

When they started serving, putting together the samples of collard greens with the smoked

turkey on top, "it was busy, busy, busy!" They served many famous people, from sports figures to comedians to actors. Nevells estimates that 1,200-1,300 people were served at their table. Tickets were \$750 for this party. And there were other Tailgate parties as well.

Afterwards, they were off to the private party at Jonetta Patton's and watched the Super Bowl from there. Nevells brought her Peaches and Scream Jam to share, and Patton loved it!

"I've never done anything remotely close to what I did there," said Mike, who explained that he has anxiety around a large group of people. "At first, it was overwhelming." But Jeddy took his hand and said, "It's going to be fine." And it was. "Once I started serving, I had a ball!"

"We had an outstanding time!" they both said. "It was amazing!" said Jeddy. "To have Chef invite us... not only invite us, but also support our business," she paused. "The things he has done is just amazing!" She continued, "I am blessed to have Chef Elliott." "It's hard to find one word to put it all in perspective," said Mike. "The people that we met are now friends. We are very fortunate and very blessed to have been presented with the opportunity we had." "It was an experience full of memories and relationships that will last a lifetime," added Jeddy.

May is running to fill a 3-year term position on the Limerick Planning Board. William B. Aronson is running to fill a 1-year term as a Trustee on the Limerick Sewerage District.

Scott R. Paradis and Robert C. Richardson Sr. are both running to fill a 2-year term position as Road Commissioner.

Write-ins are welcome for any of these positions and for two positions on the Budget Committee.

Some of the articles to be voted on by Secret Ballot are to raise money for various non-profit organizations in the area. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend to give \$500 for the American Red Cross; \$500 for Maine Health Care at Home; \$300 for Saco River Corridor Commission; and \$3,000 for Lake Arrowhead Conservation Committee. Several other articles will also be voted on by secret ballot on Fri-

day, March 8.
Some of the 75 articles on the town warrant to be voted on at the town meeting on March 9 are: To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operations of the Municipal Officers, and support staff – Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend \$85,300; To see if the town will appropriate \$355,000 for plowing, sanding and salting – Recommended by Selectmen and Budget \$355,000; To see what sum the town will appropriate for the operations of the Limerick Municipal Fire-Rescue Departments, and all supplies, etc. – Recommended \$129,966; To see if the town will appropriate \$3,000 for Lake Arrowhead Conservation Control on milfoil control; To see if the town will appropriate \$3,000 for monitoring boats on Sokokis Lake; To see if the town will accept the gift of three parcels of land, subject to covenants and restrictions. A yes vote from the Selectmen was recommended on these last three articles.

In related news, donations are being accepted for St. Matthew's Food Pantry during the voting on March 8, at the Municipal Office at 55 Washington Street.

A document she provided, states "With the support and engagement of local people, each and every member of the RSU#57 district will have the opportunity to participate in the program moving forward." eJayne claims that the Benefits of 4-D include "a Government system upgrade on a local, state, and national level, resulting in better relationships, community values, improved education quality, and the most efficient use of tax-payer's dollars." It is our hope that this memo will serve to clarify any questions regarding our district's Pre-K programs. To begin, our Pre-K programs seek to serve our local schools first (*Alfred Elementary School, Lyman Elementary School, LINE Elementary School, Shapleigh Memorial School, and Waterboro Elementary School*). Each child registered for the lottery will have an opportunity for selection. Once all openings have been filled by local residents, we will reach out to district community members who are on a waitlist to determine interest in program admittance, should spaces become available. Please review the district's criteria below to understand our program admittance criteria:

Pre-K Program Eligibility Criteria

- Students must be 4 years old by Oct. 15th and are not of kindergarten age.
- Complete *Lottery Registration Form* (required) including income. This will help predict levels of *Free and Reduced Lunch* percentages for next year and is needed in order to accurately reflect the district percentage.
- Form(s) must be completed and submitted by **March 1, 2019**.

The Pre-K registration form is available at www.rsu57.org/parents/registration. After you have completed the form, please return it to your local school's main office by March 1st. Our goal is to make program notifications by Friday, March 22nd. All students that are placed in a district Pre-K program will need to have the kindergarten registration packet filled out prior to Pre-K screening. Once all openings have been filled by lottery, remaining names will be drawn to create a waiting list, should room become available. Any interest from local school residents received after the lottery is complete and notification has taken place, will be placed on the waiting list.

If you know of any community families who may have an eligible student, please feel free to share this information. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact your local school's main office.

acquired property and \$5,000 from interest; to raise \$25,000 or the Capital Improvement Building Fund; to raise \$72,581 for the final payment on the Self Contained Breathing Apparatus for the fire and rescue departments; and to see what the town will raise for the operation of municipal buildings for the next year – the recommendation is to raise \$50,000. There are a total of 67 articles on the warrant.

In the election, Casey Tarbox is running for the Road Commissioner, unopposed. Justine Perkins is running for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector; and Nichole Hubbard is running for Town Treasurer, both unopposed. Jodi Laine is running to fill the position of School Director at RSU 57. Bruce Colwell and Kenny Gates are both running for the position of Selectman, Assessor and Overseer of the Poor. All of the positions are for a term of three years, and write-in candidates are welcome.

Selectman's race

BRUCE COLWELL is a local man who was raised in Newfield and graduated from Massabesic High School. He has worked as a self-employed contractor around town, since the graduated.

Colwell served as a selectman for 11 years prior to this year and liked working with the town and the community. He said that "I think that I can do some good, and would like to get back into working with the town." Colwell has served on the local volunteer fire department and the budget committee in past years, as well.

Colwell's love of his community shows in his fundraising efforts and his ability to bring people together. Over the past several years, he has organized the town dances, several times a year, such as New Year's, St. Patrick's, and

more to help the heating assistance program, and other worthwhile programs. He has worked on helping families and individuals in general and the Wakefield Food Pantry, which top his list of doing good for the community. Revenue from the dances is donated to the local causes.

Colwell and his wife Debby, have recently organized an annual Thanksgiving dinner at the Congregational Church for local residents, who would like to socialize with the other folks in town rather than have dinner alone. Colwell says, "My wife wanted to do this," so his entire family got involved. He feels that the community needs to get more involved, and getting out to vote would be a good start.

KENNY GATES has never been a selectman before, but has been involved in the Town of Newfield in many other ways.

He has served as Emergency Management Agency (EMA) Director, a member of the Property Appeals Board since March, 2012, and has been one of our three School Board Representatives for RSU 57, serving on both the Policy Committee and the Transportation/Security Committee since 2014; and has been a part-time Transfer Station attendant.

Prior to coming to Newfield with his wife Judi, Gates spent more than 21 years in the United States Air Force, retiring as a Master Sergeant in 1997. He also

has two Associate of Applied Science degrees in Instructor Technologies and Administration and Information Management.

Gates would like to take a strong look at the taxes to see if anything can be done to lower them. According to his research, they are being raised at a rate that "outpaces peoples' ability to pay." 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Arthritis and your pets

Many people know that as you age, you are more likely to develop arthritis. However, did you know that companion pets like dogs and cats can also develop arthritis? Arthritis is a disease that forms in the joints of your pets, it can cause severe pain. Although it is more common in older pets, it can still form in younger animals.

There are many ways to treat arthritis. Firstly, keep a close watch on your animal's activity level. Animals that suffer from arthritis will start to become less active and may gain some weight from lack of activity. Some animals may also

stop jumping up on things. If you notice these signs, contact your veterinarian immediately to prevent it from becoming worse.

There are also over-the-counter and prescription medications that can be given to your pet to help control the joint inflammation and pain. Some of these over-the-counter supplements are Dasuquin Advanced and GlycoFlex which are glucosamine based products, as well as Welactin, a fish oil supplement. Dasuquin Advanced comes in a capsule for felines, and a tasty chewable tablet, or treat for canines. GlycoFlex comes in

a tasty chew, and works for all weight ranges of felines. These have been known to work quite well for helping arthritis pain. Prescription medication can be prescribed after a medical exam and blood work. These include many different Non-Steroidal Anti-Inflammatory drugs, such as Galliprant, Carprofen, and Onsiar which all help to control pain and inflammation. Finally, a prescription diet can also be used to help joint pain.

Q: Tell us about yourself?

CUDWORTH: I am 55 years old and have lived on Ross Corner Road since 1994. I have been married to my wife Karen for 25 years and we have five children and eight grandchildren. I am the owner of Lakeside Sport and Marine and Lakeside Realty.

FAGAN: I am engaged and have three children, eight grandchildren, and one great-grandchild. I have lived in Shapleigh for 15 years.

Q: What prompted you to run for Selectman?

CUDWORTH: I love my town and want to serve it's people. I help out in food pantries and schools. People have encouraged me to enter the race.

FAGAN: A few years ago I took an assistant position under the Town Administrator, and realized I could be useful. I was approached this year and encouraged to run for Selectman. I can add a great deal to the town with my knowledge. I can make Shapleigh a place people want to stay.

Q: What is your running platform?

CUDWORTH: Look for Volunteers to fill various positions in the town. I would be careful on spending, and be open and transparent. I would be open to dialogue via text, email or stop by the store. I am not interested in micromanaging.

I worked as a licensed electrician and as a machinist at Brooks Welding and Machine, eight years at Cyro Industries overseeing multiple workers and was on the Safety Committee. I currently hold several certifications and licenses including Class A CDL License attending Northeast Technical Center in Manchester, certification in Gunsmithing through Thompson Education Direct, Federal Firearms license, nearly 17 years successfully owning and operating Lakeside Sport and Marine.

FAGAN: Volunteerism. I am passionate about civil responsibility and public service. I currently work as an Accounts Payable Supervisor in Sanford. Tracking event in Massabesic Forest

How do you know if the tracks you are looking at belonged to a fox or coyote? Or a dog? Connie Struder, knowledgeable in tracking patterns, knew what telltale signs would be obvious and explained them to her audience of 16 children and adults who were studying the tracks on the road through Massabesic Forest this past Saturday. She carried a measure with her with which she measured the tracks. Sometimes there were two pairs of tracks. At this time of year, a fox will pair up with a mate.

Among the information shared by Connie Struder was that a raccoon has five toes and resembles a human hand. They don't rinse their food in water because they are sanitary but for the tactile experience. Bobcats have four toes. Only three animal species in Maine actually hibernate, one of them being our woodchucks. Struder explained all the things which the tracks revealed, the sizes and shapes of the various tracks as the animals slipped through the forest in search of food – dog, coyote, fisher, gray fox, bobcat, but not a white footed mouse because they hibernate. We learned that deer, in early spring, crave the new buds on our shrubbery, which they may industrially strip while we sleep. If you find deer tracks on your front lawn that is why they made a visit.

The next activity sponsored by the Conservation Commission will be the yearly bird house construction which will be upstairs in Town Hall. Both adults and children are welcome to participate later in March.

Q: How do you handle conflicts, both internal and external?

CUDWORTH: I have been trained to do a job and handle situations with no emotion. If discipline needs to be done it will be done by following procedures. I show no partiality. I would never belittle or yell and would like people to feel free to come to speak to me without fear of repercussions.

FAGAN: I would take the person aside and speak to them one on one. There are two sides to every story. After I have all the facts I would deal appropriately and privately.

Voting will be held at the town hall at 22 Back Road, Shapleigh on Friday, March 8 from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Results of the election will be announced at the Annual Town Meeting on Saturday, March 9 beginning at 10 a.m. at the Shapleigh Memorial School, 467 Shapleigh Corner Road.

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Massabesic Middle School teacher receives environmental educator award

The Maine Environmental Education Association (MEEA) recently awarded the 2018 Eberhard Thiele Environmental Educator Award to Massabesic Middle School teacher, Patrick Paren. Pat has been a collaborator with the Gulf of Maine Research Institute education staff, a teacher leader in his school and for teachers around the state, and an inspiration to his students. The students in Pat's classroom are engaged in real and relevant scientific questions and tasks. His classroom emits energy and excitement. Pat's own curiosity of the natural world is clearly contagious. He is an incredible teacher and has fostered a love of science, nature, and a sense of place in his students.

The Eberhard Thiele Environmental Educator Award is designed to recognize environmental education professional who works either outside the formal classroom setting or a classroom teacher that incorporates environmental education into their pedagogical philosophy and practice. Eberhard Thiele was the first President of the MEEA in 1981 and served many years on the board and inspired many students as the Director of Environmental Studies at the University of Maine, Fort Kent.

In 2010, Pat and his students discovered a single plant of purple loosestrife on their campus. His students decided to monitor this single plant closely over time to determine if it would be an issue. Eight years later, Pat's students continue their monitoring, and so far, it remains contained. This investigation evolved into additional research into the galerucella beetle, its effectiveness as a biocontrol, and its distribution in Maine.

That is just one example of the authentic environmental research Pat and his students have been a part of. In addition to his work with Vital Signs, Pat and his students have participated in Project Learning Tree, Signs of the Seasons, and Project Noah as well. The work Pat and his students have engaged in over the years always has a strong connection to their local community and to researchers across the state.

MEEA is honored to give this award to someone whose career has been categorized by creativity, passion, and leadership in service to environmental education. Congratulations Pat!
