A POW/MIA monument will be constructed at the Southern Maine Veterans Association Cemetery in Springvale, through the efforts of the local veterans headed by the Superintendent of Cemeteries Ronald Rivard.

Rivard was guest speaker at the recent selectman's meeting on April 9, and spoke about the new monument. It will be a 9 foot tall structure, 5 feet wide, and is in remembrance of all prisoners of war and missing in action veterans. The top of it will be unfinished in honor of all men and women who remain forever missing in action, so that they will not be forgotten. Groundbreaking is expected to start in the fall of the structure, which will honor all veterans from all wars: the Cold War,

Desert Storm, Korea, WW 1, WW 2, Civil War, Revolutionary War, Spanish/American, War of 1812, Vietnam, Operation Enduring Freedom, and Iraq. And, there will be a special section for all veterans whose remains were never recovered.

In 2018, the nation marked the 100 th. anniversary of the end of WW 1, the Great War, which ended on November 11, 1918.

This year, when they start construction on the monument, their goal will be to reach \$118,000, and they have raised \$85,000 so far. Kennebunk Savings has committed to donating \$9,000, and if the cemetery committee raises \$4,500, the bank will match that, too. They have also reached out to Sanford Institute for Savings, but have not heard back yet. And they may be awarded a grant from the State of Maine.



Community garden plots available





Free FarmShares available for eligible Maine seniors *Maine Senior FarmShare Program enrollment begins*

Free-local-fresh produce for eligible Maine seniors! The Maine Senior FarmShare Program will provide 16,000 senior citizens with free fresh produce this year. Eligible Maine seniors can sign up through farmers in their area, starting immediately. Qualified participants will receive \$50 of fresh produce during the season from one of approximately 100 local participating farms.

Seniors contact participating farmers directly to sign up for the program. Farmers sign up seniors on a first-come, first-served basis, and the number of Senior Farm-Shares is limited at each farm.

"We're excited to provide so many seniors with free Senior FarmShares," said Donna Murray, the program manager. She continued, "In a recent survey 91% of the seniors reported that they ate more fruits and vegetables because of the Maine Senior FarmShare Program and over 98% would like to participate in the program again. Our farmers love the interaction with the program recipients and, of course, it helps them financially as well."

Participating Maine farmers provide the produce in a variety of ways. Seniors pick up their produce at a specific farmers' market, or at their farm or farm stand. Some farmers offer delivery to seniors at their homes or housing sites. Farmers provide a broad range of produce during the growing season. FarmShare produce includes fresh, unprocessed fruits, vegetables, and herbs.

- To qualify, a participant must:
- be a Maine resident,
- at least 60 years old,

• and have a household income of not more than 185 percent of the federal poverty income guidelines (\$22,459/individual; \$30,451/two-person household).

The Maine Senior FarmShare Program is run by the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry. The US Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service, Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) funds the program. Based on a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) model, a Senior FarmShare is an agreement between a participating farmer and a qualified senior for \$50 of fresh produce.

New Century Club looks back

What were the most outstanding events of the last century? The first successful airplane flight? And the first World Series? (1903). Edison inventing talking motion pictures? (1910)

The first Nobel Peace Prize, won by Woodrow Wilson in 1920? Or when Franklin Delano Roosevelt was elected president in 1932, promising a "New Deal"? Kate Smith singing "God Bless America" in 1938. The "Hindenburg" had blown up in New Jersey in 1937.

Al Carlson led members of the New Century Club through the time of these events and many more when the club met last Monday in the Shaker Museum. Some of the events we remembered or almost. JFK won a senate seat in 1952.There were many more events remembered by those present and he promised to continue his "looking back" at the next meeting, which will also be held in the Shaker Museum when Al Carlson will continue his review of "The First Century".

The meeting closed with a social hour and ice cream birthday cake for Harland Eastman who is celebrating his 90th birthday. Harland was responsible for the formation of a museum for Sanford, for the forums held in the Shaker Museum and many other activities for the betterment of Alfred and Sanford.
