Land trust receives grant for garden

The Sanford-Springvale Mousam Way Land Trust has been awarded a \$1,000 Walmart Community Grant Program Cybergrant from its Sanford's store. This grant will help to install a watering system for the Sanford Community Garden extension project, a project effectively doubling the number of the Garden's raised beds to over 50.

The Garden, a part of the David and Linda Pence Community Ecology Center, is located within the 110 acre McKeon Environmental Reserve in Springvale. This project, a joint effort with the University of Maine Extension's York County Master Gardener Volunteer program, helps the community gardeners with any issues that crop up during the growing season-such as pest, weed, and disease control; soil testing methods and interpretation; various raised bed growing practices; fertilization options; and healthful gardening practices.

Gardeners grow food in their 4' x 12' raised beds for themselves, for various organizations, and for local food pantries. Tools, fertilizers, disease and pest control sprays are all provided for this organic gardening project. A produce washing sink, table and chairs, outdoor restroom, and 2 ½ miles of non-motorized trails are other amenities available.

This weekend July 24-25, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., is the last weekend the Faire will be open this year. Located at the Acton Fair site, 550 Route 109, there is ample parking and space to enjoy the Faire. Tickets can be purchased online at themainerenfaire.com or at the event. The line to purchase tickets can be long, and it might be time-saving to buy tickets online.

Greeting you at the gate are the citizens of Yorkshire, England, in the time of Queen Elizabeth I. This is the Renaissance era in Europe. A time of rebirth following the Middle Ages from approximately 1300s to 1600s. Once through the gate, you are free to roam to experience the delights of living in a Renaissance village. Seven arrested in MDEA seizure in Shapleigh

For the past three months the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency (MDEA) York County Task Force has been investigating drug trafficking from 34 Coley Trafton Road in Shapleigh. Agents made undercover buys of fentanyl directly from 37-year-old Ryan Murray, the property owner from this home. This address has been the source of numerous responses by the York County Sheriff's Department for domestic violence, disturbances, and drug

MDEA Agents obtained an arrest warrant for Murray charging him with 2 counts of Unlawful Trafficking Schedule W Drugs (Fentanyl). Agents also obtained a search warrant for the property at 34 Coley Trafton Road for evidence of drug sales.

Based upon factors which lead to an increased threat level, entry to the

Maine Air National **Guard Supports NORAD Exercise**

Members of the Maine Air National Guard recently supported the North American Aerospace Defense Command's (NORAD) Exercise Amalgam Dart 21-1 to retain and improve readiness to defend North America across all approaches. To support this effort the 265th Combat Communications Squadron was tasked with supplying tactical communication networks at four geographically separated locations spanning the

Exercise Amalgam Dart ran from June 10-18, with operations ranging across the Arctic from the Beaufort Sea to Thule, Greenland. Amalgam Dart 21-1 provided NORAD the opportunity to hone continental defense skills as Canadian and U.S. forces operated together in the Arctic. Involving all three NORAD regions (Alaskan, Canadian, and Continental U.S.) the exercise featured Royal Canadian Air Force CF-18s, CC-150Ts, CC-130s, CH-146s,

Scottish kilts, swords, clothing, books, jewelry, and artisan crafts. There is an area for Jousting and exhibits from Renaissance life.

Queen Elizabeth I has also left her palace to attend the Faire. If you pay attention, you may see her visiting her subjects around the village. Every 30 minutes, a performance at one of the many stages is held across the grounds. They include medieval music and bands, comedians, belly dancing, a costume contest, a fire-twirling juggler, storytellers, as well as many others. Be prepared to interact with the "villagers" as you explore what the Faire has to offer. While there, make sure to look for the fabulous "Living Statue." This apparently stone statue is very realistic, and may startle you when it comes to life as you approach it.

Other attractions include the food booths scattered throughout the Faire. Smoked Turkey Legs, a favorite in the Elizabethan era, are available as well as more familiar fare such as hot dogs and hamburgers.

CH-149s, and a CP-140; and U.S. Air Force B-52s, F-22s, F-16s, KC-135s, KC-10s, and E-3s.

In early June, members of South Portland's 265th left to support the ten-day mission. They were divided into groups and positioned at Thule Air Base in Greenland, Canadian Forces Bases in Cold Lake, Alberta, Goose Bay in Newfoundland and Labrador, and Yellow Knife in the Northwest Territories. They arrived at these destinations aboard a KC-135 from Bangor's 101st Air Refueling Wing.

With the 265th's help, communication networks supported dozens of military aircraft and ground coordination elements participating in the exercise. Designed to train and test our capabilities, Amalgam Dart 21-1 supports Operation Noble Eagle, which applies to all air defense missions in North America.

'Participating in international exercises like this allow us to see just how effective our capabilities are in supporting largescale operations," said Maj. Brenden Westin, the 265th's officer-in-charge for the exercise. "This was an intense exercise where we played an important part in ensuring NORAD's ability to effectively communicate in an operational Arctic environment. While many of us have deployed overseas in the past, this demonstrated the 265th's importance in protecting North America."

The 265th's participation was almost cut short. At 2 a.m. on June 10, a fire destroyed the lodging quarters reserved for Westin and members of his team, along with their personal effects for the exercise. Canadian forces at Cold Lake secured lodging and provided them with new uniforms and essential personal items for

the duration of their stay. For the 265th stopping was not an option, as they knew replacements would not arrive in time to support the exercise.

Amalgam Dart 21-1 concluded on June 18 with the 265th returning to Maine the following day on another KC-135 from the 101st.

"We are all proud of the immeasurable contributions the Maine Air National Guard made to the exercise," said Maj. Gen. Douglas A. Farnham, Maine's adjutant general. "Additionally, the teamwork demonstrates what this exercise was about; from what the Canadians did after the fire for the 265th Combat Communications Squadron, to how our 101st Air Refueling Wing flew them to and from their various locations."

NORAD remains vigilant to the continued 24-7 defense of North America. A bi-national Canadian and American command, NORAD employs a network of space-based, aerial and ground-based sensors, air-to-air refueling tankers and fighter aircraft on alert, controlled by a sophisticated command and control network to deter, detect, and defend against aerial threats that originate outside or within North American airspace.


Another offensive leader included Ubaldo Lopez (Georgetown) who was the lone Mainer hitter with two hits in the game.

North Berwick woman crashes on Turnpike after falling asleep at the wheel

residence was made during the early morning hours of Thursday, July 15 by the Maine State Police Tactical Team, assisted by the Southern Maine Regional Tactical Team.

During the execution of the warrant, law enforcement encountered 28 people. They were sleeping in numerous vehicles on the property, in tents and mobile homes as well as in the residence. Of these 28 people 7 were arrested, as follows:

Ryan Murray (37) of Coley Trafton Road: Charged with 2 counts of Unlawful Trafficking Schedule W Drugs Class B. Bail was set at \$15,000. Murray was also wanted on a warrant for Failure to appear for Domestic Violence Reckless Conduct with a dangerous weapon (firearm) from York County. Murray also has an extraditable warrant from the State of New Hampshire charging Failure to appear for heroin possession. Murray is currently at the York County Jail awaiting his initial appearance.

Elysie Nichols (22) of Coley Trafton Road: charged with Aggravated Trafficking Schedule W Drugs (Fentanyl). Nichols also has an extraditable arrest warrant from NH charging Possession of Meth, Heroin and Cocaine with the Intent to Sell. Nichols is currently at the York County Jail awaiting initial appearance.

David Demirai (40) of Berwick: arrested on a warrant for Failure to Appear for Failing to Stop for a Police Officer.

Gregory Cote (29) of Sanford: arrested on a warrant for Probation Revocation and Theft.

Dawn M. Tessier (38) of Sanford: arrested on an extraditable warrant from NH charging Possession of Meth.

Brandon Scamman (41) of Baldwin: arrested on a warrant charging 2 counts failure to appear for Violation of a Protective Order.

Justin Royal (26) of Sanford: arrested on warrants charging Failure to Appear for 3 counts operating a motor vehicle without a license, 3 counts of violation of conditions of bail/release, 1 count failure to make notification of a motor vehicle accident, 1 count unlawful possession schedule drugs and 1 count theft.

All those arrested were transported to the York County Jail.

The search uncovered 36 grams of fentanyl, 32 grams methamphetamine, one loaded firearm and \$2459.00 in suspected drug proceeds.

The MDEA would like to thank the multiple agencies involved in the take down of this large scale drug operation. MDEA was assisted in this investigation by the York County Sheriff's Office and the Maine State Police. In addition, the Town of Shapleigh Code Enforcement Office was asked to respond, and they condemned the property for occupancy.

The MDEA anticipates several more people to be charged with drug trafficking charges.


